GETTING TO WILLIAMSBURG

Colonial Williamsburg is located midway between Richmond and Virginia Beach, and is 150 miles south of Washington, D.C. and 200 miles north of Raleigh, North Carolina. Whether you are traveling by plane, train, or automobile. Williamsburg is minutes from major airports, Amtrak service, and interstates.

PLANE: There are three airports conveniently located along Interstate 64 less than one hour from Williamsburg.

- Richmond International Airport (RIC) is located about 50 minutes north of Williamsburg.
- Norfolk International Airport (ORF) is located about 50 minutes south of Williamsburg.
- Newport News/Williamsburg International Airport (PHF) is located about 30 minutes south of Williamsburg.

TRAIN: The Williamsburg Transportation Center is just one mile from the Historic Area and serves as a hub for Amtrak, Williamsburg Area Transit Authority bus service, and taxi service.

AUTOMOBILE: Williamsburg is easily accessible by car through Interstate 64, Exit 238. Follow the signs to Colonial Williamsburg.
